



Identification of Persons with Developmental Disabilities Who Have Been Victims of Sexual, Emotional, and Physical Abuse

To qualify for developmental disability services in California:

- Disability must originate prior to age 18*
- Disabilities that are solely physical are not eligible conditions.
- Disabilities that are solely psychiatric are not eligible conditions.
- Learning disabilities are not eligible conditions.
 *Federal regulations go to age 21
